**Australian Drug Foundation (ADF)** ([www.adf.org.au](http://www.adf.org.au)): This site can be a little confusing if you just want basic information (downloadable fact sheets on a range of alcohol and other drug issues can be found on their [Drug Info](#) page) as the organisation has been around for a long time and does a lot! The best page to go to is the [Information and Research](#) section that has links to a range of services that the ADF provides, many of which are free. They have recently been running a NSW Government-funded community education campaign called [Breaking the ice in our community](#) and the website gives details of resources and the support networks available in that state. **Family Drug Support (FDS)** ([www.fds.org.au](http://www.fds.org.au)): The FDS is all about supporting families affected by alcohol and other drugs and their site contains some great information specifically designed for that audience. Most probably the most unique sections of the site deal with providing practical advice on how to cope with family members who are experiencing problems with drugs, as well as suggestions on how to set boundaries. This organization also provides an extremely helpful helpline

**NDARC** (2015). *On Ice*. This booklet is possibly the most comprehensive Australian resource available on the issue and GPs should find it extremely useful. Covering topics such as sex and ice, psychosis and aggression, social and legal issues associated with use, as well as dependence and cravings, this should be downloaded by GPs and used as a useful resource when dealing with methamphetamine users.
